Interestingly and controversially some researchers in the 1990s did a meta-analysis on capital punishment and its impact. They found that states without the capital punishment have consistently recorded significantly lower murder rates, and it's a gap that has grown! Yes readers, your eyesight is fine. While the research's back-and-forth continues, so does the debate on capital punishment. I am often tempted to believe that capital punishment is just an act of vengeance by the society at large. How many more punishments will have to be handed out before we finally attain peace? For how much longer will we not face the harsh reality that we don't live in a perfect society and that hanging might not be the solution to our problems?

## In quest of the God Particle

It is 8.00 pm in Geneva and I am sitting in restaurant 1 in CERN, having dinner. My mind is wandering in India, where probably my family and friends are fast asleep. Around me, I see people talking and discussing, but not about movies, clothes or new hairstyles. To my utter surprise, they are talking about particle physics, Higgs Boson a.k.a. the God Particle, the new discovery that Large Hadron Collider would make (since it is functional again from 30th June 2015), new possibilities that standard model has opened and also about their research problems. All of a sudden my eyes get fixated on an old Chinese man. I have seen him before, but where? No, I can't place him! I can't resist. I turn around to ask my Serbian friend if he knows this man. He smiles and responds "Come on! He is a Nobel laureate! Of course, you would have definitely seen him in the newspapers".

I am sure, now you can guess, imagine and understand what exactly goes on inside the largest laboratory of physics, in the world. I went to CERN, on an invitation to attend a physics workshop that was programmed with 35 lectures, 40 hours of laboratory visits and 40 hours of work group sessions. In normal circumstances one would have got bored, lost interest and wouldn't have followed a word. But the fact that the lectures were held in the same conference room where CERN made the public announcement for the discovery of Higgs Boson had a mystic effect on the participants. Moreover the lectures by the scientists working in CERN were interesting and enlightening. The occasional coffee and croissants added to the interest.

The large Hadron Collider where the collision of protons takes place is 27 km in diameter, and 150 m below the ground, running through Switzerland and France. A scientist has commented on the enormosity of data CERN has collected; that it can be expressed by a simple analogy- if you place it in a pile of CD racks then these CD racks will cover the distance to the moon and back.

What an experience seeing the LHC tunnel! I feel it is a must for every student who has studied or is studying physics in his or her life. And may I include everyone in this statement as, 'can anyone really afford to ignore physics?' It was only during the visit of CERN, that I realized how beautiful and intimidating the world of physics is! How physics is all around us, all the time. How a subject can be so abstract as well as so concrete, both at the same time!

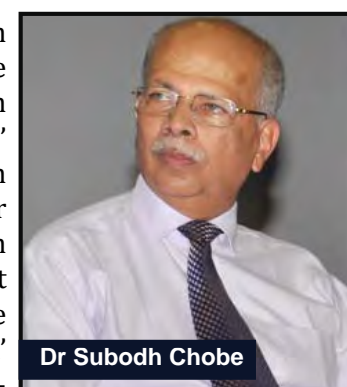
## Science Fest 2015

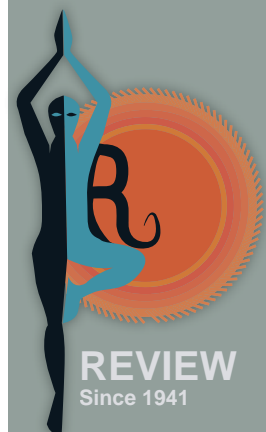
### Obituary
