

During the last fortnight, mornings and evenings have been pleasant; afternoons however were a bit warm and humid. The said period was academically demanding for the entire community as SA1 examinations were conducted for Classes IX – XII. Students and teachers could be seen exchanging copies, books, question papers and answer sheets. The preparations for the Founder's Day will begin from today and one can feel a buzz in the air already. The entire community is eagerly looking forward to the Larger-Than-Life Chief Guest, Mr Ratan N Tata's arrival. We have captured the flavor of the Founders in our front page illustration.

The VL Pathak Memorial essay writing competition was held for Classes VI and VII. Students wrote an essay on the topic 'Autobiography of a Pen'. The first three positions were secured by:

Shubham Agarwal qualified for the finals of the 3rd Nanhi Chaan All India Essay Writing competition out of 3000 entries and 150 schools and was invited to Vasant Valley School, New Delhi. The topic for the essay and discussion was 'Refugees are our collective Concern' and he was presented with an iPad mini2 for his excellent contribution. He has been invited for a week's programme at the NIIT University in December with all the other finalists.

The Department of English has initiated a programme which will help the students to become sensitive to the sound patterns in the language, thereby making them conscious of the various aspects of spoken English that are generally missed in the classroom. The first session of the programme was held on 11th and the second on the 24th of September 2016. The programme is being spearheaded by Dr Smita Trivedi, faculty in the department of English.



In the first session of the workshop, students were taught to count the number of syllables by the 'Chin Method' and the 'Clap method'. They learnt how to put stress on the first syllable in words of two syllables. They heard the model pronunciation of 100 words and reproduced the pronunciation. They also came to know about the organs of speech and the mechanism involved in production of sounds in English. During the second session of the workshop, students were introduced to 'stress on words of two syllables with the stress on the second syllable'. They also learnt how to shift the stress on the same word according to its use in the sentence-verb or noun/ adjective.

Dean of Studies Mr Dhirendra Sharma went on a ten day visit to different universities in Canada from 12th – 21st September 2016. The Universities he visited were U Guelph, Ryerson, Queens, Carlton, Calgary, Lakehead, U Alberta and Algonquin College. The visit was very fruitful as he got first-hand information of the courses offered by these universities, the infrastructure



and facilities that they provide and the quality of pastoral care extended to the students. He also learnt about the various scholarships that are offered, with some of them being exclusively for Indian students. He was also informed that since these Universities are funded by the government, their tuition fee is considerably lower than that of US and UK universities, which makes them a more viable academic option for Undergrad courses. With a focus on research oriented learning and an infrastructure comparable to the Ivy League universities they hold the promise of being an attractive destination for our students. Mr Sharma has come back with informative brochures and presentations. Students can access these and directly communicate with their Director of Admissions. The School has all the necessary information now and the Career Cell is much better equipped to train our students to apply to these centres of higher learning.

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An interaction with Lieutenant General Shokin Chauhan

A Gorkha officer, Lieutenant General Shokin Chauhan, YSM, SM, VSM visited the school on 20th September 2016. He was accompanied by his wife, Mrs Daphne Chauhan. A special Astachal was held in his honour where he narrated two personal anecdotes highlighting the importance of righteousness and leadership and how if we absorb the two values in our lives, we can earn genuine respect from society. At Astachal, he handed over a memento to the school which was graciously received by the SSP - Mriganka Ghosh. After Astachal they visited the recently established, 'Interpretation Center' and enjoyed the pictorial representation of the history of the Fort. This was followed by an interaction with the staff and the correspondents of the Review over a cup of tea in the TRC lawn. We present before you the tête-à-tête we had with him.

Q1. What inspired you to join the Army?

I am a third generation soldier. Initially I wanted to join the IIT. However, I realised well in time that Army was a natural progression of my capabilities and therefore I joined the Army.

Q2. Is it difficult to be a leader?

Indeed, it is. A leader practices sacrifice and idealism and has an aim in life, which is larger than self-gratification. I remember the sacrifices that we made to capture the Siachen Glacier in 1984. During the confrontation, we ran out of food and water but what satisfied us was our win for the country.

Q3. Sir, would you like to comment on the recent situation in Kashmir?

It is a matter of deep sorrow and grief that 18 of our soldiers died. We should have been better prepared. Pakistan should also understand that terrorism would result in nothing.

Q4. Sir, what action should we take against Pakistan?

There are majorly three ways. Firstly, we can reply through an armed attack. Secondly, we should diplomatically and politically deal with this issue and



thirdly, we must continuously endeavour to isolate them in the world. A multipronged approach will have to be executed for sustained advantage. And I would like to add, that world only recognises strength, nothing but strength and that is what we should continuously build.

Q5. What are the factors that you keep in mind while planning an offensive?

Firstly, we assess our capability and resources. Then we estimate the enemy's weapons and abilities. However, often during a confrontation, planning is of limited help because actual dynamics become very different. It is on-the-spot leadership skills with which one leads the troops which makes all the difference. Thank you.


