The visit to the breathtakingly beautiful Pangong lake was a memorable experience for all. The entire group returned with a great sense of fulfilment and with high words of praise for Scindian initiative and leadership.

Mr Anil Pathania along with 12 students went for a trek up to Everest Base Camp to height of 18000ft. The team returned by 22nd May 2017.

A Report on the Expedition to the Everest Base Camp, Nepal

Do mountains fascinate you? Have you ever thought of climbing it, especially the Everest? Do you fear death or is life more fearful? A group of 14 bag-packers were ready to unravel such mysteries post a few training sessions; and all set for their fifteen days' long adventure trip.

On 7th May 2017 we arrived in Kathmandu at Tribhuvan International airport, a team of 13 members comprising both teachers and students. We met our representatives and were transferred to the hotel for night stay. The day after, we prepared ourselves for a trek in Kathmandu and the very next day we flew to Lukla in a plane. Lukla is considered to be the world's most dangerous airport as the runway is on a mountain with dangerous swamps at both sides. Post our arrival at Lukla, the trek was mainly downhill following the river to Phakding. It was almost 3 - 4 hours of steady walking that we did.

On 10th May, the trek began from Phakding to Sherpa which is the capital of Namche Bazaar and almost at a height of 3400 meters. Post 6 hours of brisk walking the rest of the day was free to be explored by students. It was a stiff climb for almost 500 metres and it took almost

4 hours to cover the same. Next day was reserved for rest and acclimatization in Namche with an optional hike to the viewpoint of the Everest, Lhotse and Amadablam. Two days' stay at Namche was helpful in acclimatization of body that helps in getting used to the weather, atmosphere and temperature because in the process we trek at the same height for a few hours to make our body adjust to the temperature outside.

On 12th May the trek to Thyangboche began, which is at the height of 3860 meters and is located on a ridge. The place is just below the impressive



north ridge of Kang Taiga. It was almost an 8 hour climb with 300 metres of stiff climbing followed by a trek to the seasonal settlement of Dingboche at 4410meters. It was at the entrance to the Khumbu Valley and required 6 hours of walking at a stretch. With a night halt at the camping village; life was not as easy. On May 14, post acclimatization the walk began towards Imja Valley which offered a fantastic view of Tibet. The group then returned to Dingboche and on 15th May had a short day trekking beside the Khumbu Glacier to the lodges at Lobuche at 4910 meters. It was a 3 hours' walk.



The Trek to Everest Base Camp at 18,000 feet was surely a spectacular sight; something everyone should do once in a lifetime. The group began its journey on 16th May, following the Moraine and Khumbu Glacier and returned to Gorakshep after 8 to 9 hours of walking. A walk on the glaciers is certainly a walk to remember even though the way is tricky and the constant fear of a landslide keeps you on careful toes. The trek to Pangboche, gave us the view and visit of the monastery followed by an alternative high trail to Phortse at 3800 metres, post 6 - 7 hours of walking. On 19th May the trek was via Mon La to join the main Everest trail to Namche Bazaar and the group had an overnight stay in the Sherpa capital. Finally, on May 20th downhill trekking was done beside the Dudhkosi River, with a final short climb to Lukla and on 21st May the group flew back to Kathmandu and checked into the luxuries of a hotel with full day rest followed by sightseeing and shopping. The journey ended on 22nd May at the Kathmandu Airport.



A Report on the Residential Project at Spiti

The International Award for Young People (IAYP) is an award which helps young people to achieve their potential and develop into responsible citizens. It motivates them to challenge themselves in different fields including social service and adventure. The Award has three stages - Bronze, Silver and Gold. For someone who aspires for the gold award, one needs to fulfill the requirements, which includes physical recreation, social service, adventure, skill development and most importantly, residential projects.

This year, I, Moksh Jaswal, along with 5 other students namely Kartikey Agrawal, Mukund Agarwal, Mani maloo, Prabhav Nandiwada and Raj from The Scindia School along with our escort teacher Mr Akash Sharma had the opportunity to go for the Residential Project as a part of the IAYP gold award. The project was organized by Ecosphere and was held from 2nd June to 17th June in Lahaul Spiti, Himachal Pradesh. Ecosphere is a social enterprise, founded and run by Mr Sunil Chauhan and Mrs Ishita

Khanna. It works on the concept of sustainable development in the Spiti Valley and organizes various projects for volunteers.

As coordinated by Ecosphere, our group started the first leg of its journey on 2nd June in a bus ride from Delhi to Shimla. The second leg of the journey was from Shimla to Kaza, where we met our coordinator and were briefed about



our project. We reached the project site after completing the journey on 6th June, at a village named Pang Mo, at a distance of 30 kms from Kaza.

This year our task was to help build a greenhouse for a local family in the village. We started our work on the 6th of June and finished it on June 15th, working every day from 9a.m. to 5a.m. After toiling for 7 days the Greenhouse was ready and was inaugurated on 15th June by the Head Monk of the local

monastery.

We also went for a trek from 10th to 13th June, covering a distance of 25 kilometers through the steep hills in 3 days and had the opportunity to visit the highest motorable village of the world named Komic and the highest Post Office of the world named Hikkim, while trekking through the black mountains of the middle Himalayas. The trek gave us an insight about the survival of life in the charming yet difficult terrain, which remains closed to the rest of the world for the most part of the year due to snow.

We started our return journey from Kaza early in the morning on the 16th and reached Manali via Rohtang Pass after a 14 hours' drive where we boarded our bus for Delhi. We arrived at Delhi on the 17th. During this brief period of time we could experience the serenity of Himalayas by mentally comparing it to the hubbub of Delhi as we traversed between two strikingly different temperature zones of 4°C and 46°C.





A Report on the Career Exploratory Programme, East Coast, USA

The objective of this programme was to explore the career opportunities at the places visited. The group contained students with classes varying from 8 to 11.

From India we flew to New York and then to Orlando. Visit to Kennedy Space centre, NASA was for the duration of two days. The first day we took a bus tour of various workstations at the tour guide. The centre uses the latest technology for space research. Amazing enough, they not only do space research but also conserve wild life, which was very conspicuous to us, in this visit. The next day, we visited Rocket Garden, 3D IMAX films on Space, and Atlantis Exhibitions. The best part of this visit was the simulation of Shuttle launching. The day was a memorable day for all of us as we lunched with the astronaut, Kem Cameron. He gave a presentation on his journey to space. He

also interacted with the students. We were surprised to know that the 'Visitors Section of Kennedy Space Centre' runs on the fee collected by visitors. Students received a lot of knowledge on the careers in Aerospace Engineering.

In the next two days we visited the Island of Adventure and Sea World. The mesmerizing show of dolphins and the aquariums was a part of the 'Sea World'. We discussed about the careers related to Water Conservation Specialist, Ecologist and Adventure.

Next was the visit to beautiful natural Water Fall – the Niagara Falls. We were wonderstruck to learn how tourism plays a vital role in inflating USA's economy. There was another career in store for us which we could in future lay our hands upon.

Next visit was like dream come true- the visit to MIT and Harvard University in Boston. We had a student guide from both the universities and both of them were students of Physics. They explained to us the admission procedure, various courses offered and also about the culture of the universities. It was raining heavily during the visit to Harvard, but the aura of the place was so overpowering that it didn't affect any of us. We also got know that both these universities have only need- based scholarship. During exams the students are really stressed and hence the university plans the activity just a day before or on same day to release the student's stress. We visited almost all the departments of the university and also got to know how these universities came into existence. Structural Designing was another career that we looked into.

We visited Madam Tussad's Wax Museum, where students clicked lot of pictures with the wax statues of many iconic celebrities. Here students were asked to analyse Art as a career. All the students were left in the Times Square for shopping of souveniers. The next day we had an exciting workshop on Broadways which is an organization that has many actors who put up plays at different venues. In this workshop they asked the students to concentrate on three things -body, mind and voice. The conveyor helped us in doing some exercises to make the body and mind active; and also for voice modulation. The careers discussed were not only of an actor but also Film director and Artistic Director.



Our facilitator, Ms Kriti Chopra was there to talk about all the careers and subject choices. She also gave us the information about courses and the skills required for the specific careers. She gave the worksheet to the students to fill in after every visit.

It was an unforgettable experience for all of us.

It was an unforgettable experience to be the part of a month's Faculty Development Programme from the 24th of April to 30th of May 2017. The programme was held at Indian Institute of Management, Indore (IIM, Indore).

Living in the purlieu of the scenic campus of IIM Indore, and to be taught by the accomplished faculty was like living your most cherished dream. The programme is essentially designed for teachers of management and allied subjects like Commerce, Economics, Finance, Psychology, Sociology and so on...

About 100 sessions in 13 Subjects were conducted over a period of 35 days! Subjects like Pedagogy and Negotiation, Research Methodology, Communication for leaders etc. were taught to us. An interesting session was taken by the Director of IIM, Indore, Prof. Krishnan who focused on the need for good teachers and how teachers must upgrade themselves.

The discussion was based on the needs of the changing education scenario. He also emphasized that teachers must instill reading habits in their students. The Faculty Development Programme provided me with a new perspective towards education and teaching. I am hopeful that it would add value to the exercise of teaching.

For me it was an interesting journey and I hoped it would never end.

A Report on the **Educational Tour** to France

The Scindia School organised an educational trip to Paris for 10 days with the purpose of giving exposure to the students about the various cultural aspects of France. The group consisted of 15 students accompanied by our French teacher, Mr Dhiraj Malik. We left for Paris on the night of the 20th May from Delhi via Mumbai to Paris. The entire group stayed with several host families thereby gaining a rich experience of the daily lifestyle of a French family.

The students would travel to Paris and attend French beginners' course for initial 5 days studying for 2 hours daily. The rest of the day would be spent in visiting some famous

French monuments and museums. One entire day was dedicated to visit a theme based amusement park called "Park Asterix".

We visited many places in Paris. In The Paris Story Museum we watched a 50 minutes' show which was about the history of Paris. The Grevin Wax Museum which houses a great number of wax statues of world famous personalities and the Eiffel tower were two great monuments that we visited.

'Bateaux Mouche' on river Seine refers to the one hour ferry boat ride which gave us a chance to explore the scenic beauty of Paris. We also visited 'Champs Elysees', the famous road where the annual Bastille Day Parade is carried out. While 'Place de la Concorde' is the central point of overall ministries of French Government, 'Arc de la Triomphe' is the monument built to celebrate the victories of Napoleon Bonaparte.

The 'Louvre Museum', is one of the greatest museums dedicated to art work showcasing the famous Mona Lisa painting and the Notre Dame Cathedral is a very ancient and symbolic church of France where the Crowning Ceremony of Napoleon Bonaparte was carried out.

We also saw the Versailles Castle which had been the centre stage of the French revolution and also the royal palace of the King, Louis Philippe 16th.

The group left Paris for Delhi via Abu Dhabi on the night of 30th of May and reached Delhi on the morning of 31st of May.





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
