He is now a music producer and has three albums to his credit. He addressed the students and shared his experiences which





was followed by an interesting Question and Answer session.

Dr Madhav Deo Saraswat, Principal, The Scindia School was a part of an enriching panel discussion organised by BW Education on Wednesday, the 19th of February 2020 in Delhi. The School Leaders Conclave was a unique initiative which combined keynote presentations, round tables and workshops



to facilitate effective partnership building for senior figures from schools with other important stakeholders from the educational landscape. "What next in Education Technology?" was the topic which was under discussion. The views of the Principal, Dr Saraswat were not only appreciated but also added a new dimension to the conversation.

The Middle Group Inter House English Debates commenced on the 6th of February, 2020 and were marked closed on the 10th of February, 2020. The debates were divided into 5 rounds. The teams comprised of 4 participants from each House, 3 speakers and 1 interjector. The format of the debates was the Special Scindia Format designed by the English Debating Society of the school. As per the Special Scindia Format, the first speakers of both the houses were invited together on the stage and they spoke one after the other within

three time-brackets. The subsequent speakers followed the same pattern. The first bracket was of 2 minutes each, the second bracket was of 1.5 minutes each, and the third bracket was of 1 minute each. The speakers also had to take one question from the interjector assigned to them. Four rounds of the debates were judged by a panel of 8 student judges from class XI; 1 from every House. The final round was between the teams of Jayappa House (Government) and Mahadji House (Opposition) and the speakers were:

Bhuvanesh Gonugunta (Prime Minister)

Satyam Raj (Leader of Opposition)

Gyan Shanker (Deputy Prime Minister)

Daksh Bajaj (Deputy Leader of Opposition)

Shirish Mehra (Government Whip)

Nikunj Singhal (Opposition Whip)

The interjectors for the final round were Ansh Garg from Mahadji House, Ayushman Rai from Jeevaji House, and Ansh Thawani from Shivaji House. The motions for the debates were as follows:

Round 1: The Indian student community supports the idea of school prayers being free from religious connotations.

Round 2: This house, as rational citizens of the country, believes that intrusion of privacy has strengthened the stereotypical gender narrative of the Indian society.

Round 3: The rational citizens of the world regret the overestimation of inner beauty in a world where fashion makes more logical threads.

Round 4: This house, as liberal feminists, condemns parents' disregard of the child's agency in matters that shape his/her primary interests.

Round 5: The Scindian community believes that the glorification of legacy has interrupted the school's progress in the modern society.

The final round was graced by 3 faculty members and 4 students as judges. Principal, Dr. Madhav Deo Saraswat graced the occasion and expressed his satisfaction upon witnessing such an engaging debate. He pointed out various aspects that make the conversation on the motion more valid and urged the students to take on these angles in the future. Dr Saraswat also congratulated the students of class XI, who were a part of organizing, judging, and mentoring the participants since round 1. Vice Principal (Pastoral Care), Ms Smita Chaturvedi, who graced as a part of the adjudication panel, shared her valuable feedback, highlighting crucial technical angles of debating. The event ended with a vote of thanks proposed by the English Debating society and a group photograph.

They shall also be able to network with other members of the fraternity and satisfy their intellectual, cultural and social interests whenever they return to their roots.

Old Boys, Board members, Principal, Vice Principal, staff, retired teachers, and well-wishers gathered to take part in the celebration of the inauguration of the SOBA House. Mr Vinay Modi along with Mr RS Pawar inaugurated the new block by unveiling a plaque and lighting the lamp. Following this, all the dignitaries and guests were led into
