

# संगीत साधक श्री राजा बनर्जी से एक भेंदवार्ता

सृष्टि का प्रारंभ ही संगीत से हुआ है और इसका प्रत्येक कण संगीत में डूबा हुआ है। यह एक साधना है जिसमें एकाग्रता और तल्लीनता की आवश्यकता निरंतर रहती है। संगीत में सतत परिवर्तन एक सामान्य प्रक्रिया है। भारतीय संगीत में भी समय के साथ अनेक बदलाव हो रहे हैं परंतु ध्यान यह रखना है कि उसकी आत्मा में परिवर्तन न हो। भारतीय शास्त्रीय संगीत का भविष्य उज्र्वल है। यदि लगन हो तो कहीं न कहीं से रास्ता अवश्य मिल जाता है। इन विचारों को मानने वाले सिंधिया स्कूल में सत्ताइस वर्षों से संगीत साधना के लिए समर्पित श्री राजा बनर्जी के साथ एक साक्षात्कार ।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता - आप किस उम्र में संगीत से जुड़े और आपको कब यह लगा कि मेरा क्षेत्र संगीत ही है?

श्री राजा बनर्जी - संगीत के प्रति रुझान मुझे बचपन से ही मेरे माता-पिता से ही मिला है। बचपन से ही मैं सिनेमा के गाने गया करता था। फिर जब मैं विद्यालय में शिक्षा पूरी करके महाविद्यालय गया तो संगीत के प्रति रुझान ज्यादा होने के कारण संगीत को ही अपना विषय बना लिया।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता - संगीत कला के इस क्षेत्र में आपके प्रारंभिक प्रेरणा स्रोत कौन रहे हैं?

श्री राजा बनर्जी - मेरे माता-पिता...। पहले मैं अपने विद्यालय में गाता था। मेरे माता-पिता भी शौकिया गाते थे और उन्हीं को देखकर मैं प्रेरित हुआ। एक बार तो जब कक्षा चौथी में पढ़ता था तब अपना ट्युशन छोड कर शास्त्रीय संगीत सुनने के लिए एक महाविद्यालय में चला गया था। वहाँ मेरी तन्मयता को देखकर संभवत: मेरे पिता ने यह भाँप लिया होगा कि मैं संगीत के क्षेत्र में जा सकता हाँ। महाविद्यालय में अपनी शिक्षा ग्रहण करते हुए मैं चंदैनी गोंदा नामक एक गायन समूह से जुड़ा था जिसमें अधिकांश रूप से मैं छत्तीसगढी गीत गाया करता था। वहाँ पर मेरी लोकप्रियता बढी और इसी लोकप्रियता के कारण मेरे माता पिता ने संगीत क्षेत्र में आने के लिए मुझे प्रोत्साहित किया। एक कारण यह भी था कि कक्षा बारहवीं तक मैं विज्ञान का विद्यार्थी रहा परंतु संभवतः में विज्ञान के लिए नहीं बना था और संगीत ही मेरा क्षेत्र था तब पिताजी ने मुझे संगीत के क्षेत्र में ही जाने की सलाह दी।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता - आपने अपनी संगीत शिक्षा कहाँ से प्रारंभ की और किस गुरु से आपने शिक्षा दीक्षा ली ?

श्री राजा बनर्जी - संगीत की शिक्षा मैंने इंदिरा कला संगीत विश्वविद्यालय, खैरागढ से ली जो कि आजकल छत्तीसगढ में आता है। मेरे गुरुजी का नाम पंडित जगदीश प्रसाद पंडित था। कलकत्ता में जाकर उनसे मैंने गंडा बँधवाया था। मेरे गुरुजी देश के विख्यात संगीतज्ञ बड़े गुलाम अली साहब के शिष्य थे। उनका शिष्य में कैसे बना इसकी भी एक कहानी है- मैं स्नातक (प्रथम वर्ष) में पढ रहा था। हमारी कुछ कक्षाएँ शाम को होती थीं। शाम को कक्षा समाप्त होने के पश्चात जब मैं विश्वविद्यालय के उप-कुलपति के घर के पास से गुजर रहा था तो वहाँ से मैंने रेकॉर्ड प्लेयर पर बजते हुए शास्त्रीय संगीत को सुना तो फिर मैं वहीं ठिठक गया और लगातार उस राग को सुनता रहा। अचानक ऊपर से उप-कुलपति महोदय श्री विमलेंद्र मुखर्जी ने मझे देखा और मझे ऊपर बला लिया. वह काफी देर से मझे अपने बरामदे से देख रहे थे । उन्होंने मुझसे पूछा- क्या गाना तुमको इतना पसंद आया? मैंने कहा- जी। उन्होंने कहा - तुम्हें मालुम है यह कौन गा रहे हैं?.... पंडित जगदीश प्रसाद। मैं इन्हें जानता भी हूँ - मैंने कहाँ। उन्होंने अचानक पूछा- क्या तुम इनसे सीखना चाहोगे? मैं तो जैसे हवा में उडने लगा था, मैं बहुत खुश हो गया। मैंने उनसे पूछा- क्या ये मुझे गाना सिखाएँगे? क्यों नहीं- मैं एक पत्र तुम्हें दूँगा, तुम उनसे जाकर मिलना, वे तुम्हें अवश्य गाना सिखाएँगे - उन्होंने कहा। और इस प्रकार मैंने पंडित जगदीश प्रसाद जी से गंडा बनवाया और उनका शिष्य बना।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता – भारत के विभिन्न घरानों में से आप का संबंध किस घराने से है?

श्री राजा बनर्जी - पटियाला घराने से, हमारे गुरुजी पटियाला घराने से रहे हैं इसलिए मुख्य रूप से उनका प्रभाव मेरे संगीत पर पड़ा है। इसके अलावा महाविद्यालय में मैंने अन्य गुरुओं से भी संगीत की शिक्षा ग्रहण की है जिनकी शैलियाँ भिन्न थीं इसीलिए मूल रूप से एक घराने का होते हुए भी मेरे गायन में विविधता है। पुराने समय में घर आने का बंधन होने के कारण संगीत की अन्य शैलियों को सीखना कठिन था परंतु आज ऐसा नहीं है इसलिए धीरे-धीरे यह घराने महत्वहीन होते जा रहे हैं हालाँकि कई स्थानों पर इनका महत्व अभी भी बना हुआ है। कई संगीतकार इस परंपरा को मानते चलते हैं लेकिन मूल बात यही है कि विद्यालयों और महाविद्यालयों में विभिन्न शैलियों में सिखाने के कारण आज इनमें परिवर्तन आ रहा है। आज सोशल मीडिया के कारण हम विभिन्न संगीत शैलियों को सुन और सीख सकते हैं।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता- आपने अध्यापन कार्य कब प्रारंभ किया और आपने यही रास्ता क्यों चुना ?

श्री राजा बनर्जी – स्नातक करने के पश्चात् मैंने सेंट्रल स्कूल में एक वर्ष तक अध्यापन कार्य किया लेकिन मुझे लगा कि मुझे संगीत में स्नातक करने के पश्चात और आगे पढ़ना चाहिए। फिर संगीत में स्नातकोत्तर करने के पश्चात् मैंने सोचा कि मैंने जो कुछ सीखा है उसको अगली पीढ़ी तक पहुँचाने के लिए विद्यालय सबसे उपयुक्त स्थान है जहाँ मैं विभिन्न प्रकार के छात्रों की पहचान करके उन्हें उन्हीं के अनुसार संगीत की शिक्षा प्रदान कर सकूँ, उन्हें भी मंच तक पहुँचा सकूँ।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता – संगीत की विभिन्न शैलियों जैसे –ध्रुपद, ख़याल, ठुमरी में आज सबसे अधिक किस शैली को बच्चे सीखना चाहते हैं?

श्री राजा बनर्जी – संगीत के इन तीनों विधाओं में सबसे कठिन 'ध्रुपद' होता है, उसके बाद सरलता के क्रम में 'ठुमरी' और फिर उसके बाद 'ख़याल' आता है । वैसे तो आज के बच्चे शास्त्रीय संगीत सीखना कम ही पसंद करते हैं। जिन बच्चों में थोड़े बहुत संगीत के गुण पाए जाते हैं वो तो हिंदी सिनेमा के गाने या पाश्चात्य संगीत को ही गाते–बजाते हैं। बहुत ही कम बच्चे शास्त्रीय संगीत सीखते हैं। उनमें से 'ख़याल' को ही ज्यादा पसंद करते हैं। उनमें से भी कुछ बच्चे 'ठुमरी' और उसके बाद सबसे कम 'धुपद' सीखते हैं। मंच से बच्चों का एकल–गायन बहुत प्रभावकारी होता है।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता – आपने अनेक बार, अनेक मंचों से अपने संगीत की प्रस्तुति दी है। मंच पर जाने से पहले आप किस प्रकार की तैयारी करते हैं?

श्री राजा बनर्जी – किसी भी मंच पर जाने से पहले यह ध्यान रखना पड़ता है कि यह मंच किस प्रकार का है या यह कार्यक्रम किस संदर्भ में आयोजित किया जा रहा है या श्रोता किस प्रकार के हैं? और इसी के अनुसार हमें अपने संगीत का चयन करना पड़ता है। मंच के लिए अभ्यास और संगीत का चयन करने के अलावा मैं शास्त्रीय संगीत का रियाज़ प्राय: प्रतिदिन सुबह करता हूँ।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता – मंच पर प्रस्तुति देते हुए क्या आपको कोई ऐसी घटना याद है जिसने आपके जीवन को प्रभावित किया हो?

श्री राजा बनर्जी – मेरे लिए मंच की प्रत्येक प्रस्तुति एक नया अनुभव देती है। ऐसी कोई विशेष घटना तो याद नहीं परंतु इतना अवश्य कह सकता हूँ कि श्रोतागणों द्वारा मिले प्रत्येक प्रोत्साहन से मैं प्रभावित होता रहा हूँ। इससे संगीत के प्रति मेरी श्रद्धा, संगीत से प्यार, संगीत के प्रति सर्वस्व-समर्पण और संगीत को अपने जीवन का सबसे महत्वपूर्ण अंग मानने के मेरे विश्वास को बल मिला है।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता – गायन में आप मन्ना डे को बहुत पसंद करते हैं इसका कोई विशेष कारण?

श्री राजा बनर्जी – उनके गले से मेरा गला मिलता है। ग्वालियर निवासी प्रसिद्ध हास्य किव प्रदीप चौबे जी ने मेरा एक प्रोग्राम करवाया था जो मन्ना डे को ही समर्पित था, उसी कार्यक्रम में मुझे उन्होंने हु-ब-हू मन्ना डे की उपाधि दी थी। यहाँ विद्यालय में भी हमारे सहयोगियों का आग्रह उन्हीं के गाने सुनने की रहती है। एक बार एक विदेशी छात्र ने जब मन्ना डे का गाना सुना तो उसने मुझे उनके गाने को दुबारा सुनाने का आग्रह किया।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता - क्या आपको लगता है कि भारतीय शास्त्रीय संगीत का प्रचलन विदेशों में भारत से भी अधिक है?

श्री राजा बनर्जी – भारतीय शास्त्रीय संगीत का प्रचलन विदेशों में भारत से भी अधिक हो रहा है यह कह पाना तो कठिन है, हाँ, इतना अवश्य कह सकता हूँ कि भारतीय शास्त्रीय संगीत का प्रचलन विदेशों में बहुत ज्यादा हो रहा है। वो हमारे संगीत को बहुत पसंद करते है। इसका श्रेय हमारे देश के बड़े कलाकारों को जाता हैं जिनमें कई नाम हैं।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता – भारतीय संगीत की लगभग हर विधा पर पश्चिमी संगीत का प्रभाव दृष्टिगत होता है। क्या भारतीय शास्त्रीय संगीत भी इससे प्रभावित हुआ है?


श्री राजा बनर्जी – अवश्य हुआ है। यह मनुष्य की प्रकृति है, उसे एक नयापन, बदलाव चाहिए। भारतीय संगीत के कलाकारों ने भी ऐसा ही प्रयोग अपने संगीत के साथ किया। शास्त्रीय संगीत के रागों के बंदिशों में आधुनिक वाद्य-यंत्रों का प्रयोग करने लगे है। जिसे आज 'फ्यूजन' के रूप में देखा जा रहा है। बदलाव तो सृष्टि का नियम है, समय के साथ सब कुछ बदलता है। आज 'फ्यूजन' को बहुत पसंद किया जा रहा है, विशेषकर युवा – वर्ग में यह काफी प्रचलित हो रहा है। ऐसे में हमें बस यह ध्यान रखने

की आवश्यकता है कि भारतीय संगीत की आत्मा से कोई खिलवाड़ न हो चाहे उसका वाह्य स्वरूप कितना ही बदलता रहे।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता – कहाँ जाता है कि आज भारतीय शास्त्रीय संगीत अपने बुरे दौर से गुज़र रहा है इस संबंध में आपके क्या विचार हैं?



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## N MEMORIAM

Prelude: Pyare Mohan Khar who was better known by his acronym PMK was born on July 26,1926 at Sehore in erstwhile Central Provinces. After completion of his MSc from Holkar College, he joined the Scindia school in 1950 and taught there till his retirement in 1987. Post 1987, he moved initially to Delhi from where he shifted to Nashik. He breathed his last on 27<sup>th</sup> December 2022 following a brief illness. He was the housemaster of Madhav House from 1962 to 1977. The tribute that follows is by one of his students who had the dual good fortune of being his student both in the chemistry class and in the House.

PMK was a giant in more than one way. His external appearance certainly created that impression. The scar on the left side of his face and his impenetrable eyes gave the impression of a stern countenance which could change as soon as he let out a loud guffaw. But for me,he was more of an intellectual giant who was sent to illumine the lives of scores of his students on whose minds he left an indelible impression. Sometimes however his palms made impressions of a crimson hue on the cheeks of the truant but whether that left an indelible mark on the recipient is certainly a moot point. PMK was always a strict disciplinarian, and the physical retribution was a reminder that one did not cross the red lines laid down by him.

So coming back to the giant, he was in many ways like the central character in the childhood fable created by Oscar Wilde. But there is a twist in the tale as PMK can only be described as a selfless giant. We played in his garden and then left on our destined paths armed with the wisdom and knowledge acquired over the years spent under his tutelage. For those who took up science and were fortunate to have been in his class, chemistry was a cake walk. He had the uncanny ability to pique an interest in a subject which many consider as dry and insipid. His forte was in explaining concepts and as far I can remember he despised rote learning.....

Of the many things that I admired in him, the foremost was the fact that he was ever willing to stick his neck out for someone whom he felt was being denied justice. A small anecdote to prove this point: the date of the Platinum jubilee debate clashed with the departure of the school football team to Indore for the triangulars. The football coach left me with a Hobson's choice: Stay for the debate or depart with the team. I was downcast and decided to share my predicament with him (PMK). He listened to my story and said "I can't see why you can't have your cake and eat it too!" A forceful plea was made to the principal who sanctioned my travel to Indore and I boarded the bus gleefully after the completion of the debate. I may add here that it was PMK who introduced me to the term Hobson's choice along with a myriad of other terms.

PMK loved to coin neologisms. The neologisms covered both animate and inanimate objects. He had an utter disdain for films and film actors in particular. So Amitabh Bachhan was rechristened as Bachhan Kumar and Dharmendra also acquired the same surname! The neologisms spilled on to the chemistry lab where the troika of Dr Ingle, PMK and Mr Ghangrekar indulged themselves with "Beeko Tea" (tea in beakers) which was inspired from the Cona Coffee served in the fancy restaurants of Bombay! He also devised the term Dholpuri Football which denoted aimless kicking of the ball in the air rather than passing it with surgical precision. Perhaps the last one attributed to him is "Amma jaan" for Amazon.

He was a veritable storehouse of knowledge the repertoire of which ranged from Science, Sports, English and Hindi literature, Urdu poetry and music. The noteworthy point is that his knowledge was acquired in the pre-internet era where the only source of knowledge was self-reading and in-depth discussions with peers. His mastery was how he summarized this information into small capsules which were fed to the young students. He was the only teacher on the Fort who could discuss Aldous Huxley, Neils Bohr, JBS Haldane, George Orwell, GB Shaw and so many other scholars with consummate ease. The meaning of the immortal lines penned by *Ghalib* need to be be contorted to describe this quality of PMK:

Bazeecha itfal hai duniya mere aage, Hota hai shab o roz tamasha mere aage

For him acquisition of knowledge related to any field was merely child's play indeed!

It is difficult to single out which was the foremost leadership skill he imparted to his students. The Persian word "Bebaak" would be my pick. Bebaak means to be outspoken and fearless; someone who is not afraid to speak his mind. PMK was one person who didn't mince his words and was not afraid to call a spade as a spade. Some of his students certainly imbibed this quality and I am reasonably convinced that it caused them little regret in their life. He certainly didn't train his students to be lackevs!



Another attribute one learnt from him was diligence and personally I feel he favored diligence over intelligence. The painstaking way in which he helped us solve chemical equations were lessons in diligence and it became ingrained in our future endeavors.

He was passionate about urdu poetry and I would be in no position to gauge his passion as my interaction with him was at age when I did not even know the urdu alphabet. These facts were brought to light at his prayer meeting when his students of yester years quoted so many lines which he rattled verbatim. In hindsight his satirical wit was certainly reminiscent of Saadat Hasan Manto and perhaps they shared a common dislike for Uncle Sam!

For many of us PMK would always be the person who shaped our lives: we were the clay, he was the master potter at work who toiled endlessly to transform his "blighters" to "men of substance."

Mrs Kamal Khar his "shareek e hayat" stood by his side through thick and thin. His three children **Sanjay**, **Kaumudi** and **Nandini** are indeed privileged to have a father who has left behind such a rich legacy.

It would not be inappropriate to end this obituary with a due apology to *Mirza Ghalib* 

Ye massail e tasawaf, ye tera byaan "Pyare" Tujhe hum wali hi samjhenge, gar koi khwaar bhi hota..

(Your concerns so mystic, so inimitable your style PMK You will always be revered as a Saint by us, even if you had any vice)



# REVIVING THE ART OF STORY TELLING: WHAT DOES THE JOURNEY OF THE INDIAN KAAVAD MEAN?

"Children must be taught how to think, not what to think." - Margaret Mead

In a recently published book "Sapiens- A Brief History of Humankind" the author Yuval Noah Harari has looked into the beginning of humankind and the reasons behind the success of our species in the battle of dominance. He claims that 100,000 years ago, at least six human species inhabited the earth, today there is just one- us- Homo Sapiens. Why did we succeed? Amongst the many reasons provided, an important explanation given is about our language. However, many animals including all ape and monkey species have vocal language, what, then is so special about our language? The most common answer is that our language is amazingly supple. We can connect a limited number of sounds and signs to produce an infinite number of sentences, each with a distinct meaning. We can thereby ingest, store, and communicate a prodigious amount of information about the surrounding world. At the same time, our unique languages have also evolved as a means of sharing information about the world and at the same time also speak about things that don't really exist.

Thus we see that stories have existed long before recorded history, and the telling of stories has changed forms drastically throughout the ages. From cave painting to novels to movies, stories have always fascinated mankind. Although the methods have changed, the desire to tell and hear stories has remained unchanged, and still greatly impacts the way we look at life.

Since times immemorial, storytellers have roamed across India for ages, and today our country is a rich reservoir in story telling with an amazing variety of tales and techniques. A number of storytelling forms still use visual props: the intricately painted phad scroll and the ingenious story box, kaavad with folding doors are both from Rajasthan. In West Bengal, a long vertical scroll, the pata, is used, as singing tellers share a story in homes or at funerals and functions.

A long wide, vertical scroll, the padam, is still used at times in Andhra Pradesh to present a vivid painted version of the *Ramayana* or *Mahabharata*. In *Maharashtra*, the story telling form of *chitrakatha* was popular in earlier days, when a teller and musician shared the epics using small, painted pictures, often pasted back to back and displayed during the telling.

Musical storytelling forms also flow across India. In parts of North India, the manbhatt shares stories while he plays fine rhythms on

a metal pot (bhatt). *Kirtan*, in Maharashtra, is a stirring, devotional mixture of song and dramatic narrative, performed by a kirtankar and accompanying musicians. It spread to the south, centuries ago and became *harikatha* and kathakalakshepa.

Pandavani, in Madhya Pradesh, features a central teller/singer who tells and sings with drama, while several musicians provide refrain. In Southern India, the ballads of the villupaatu tellers share legends of regional heroes and spirits, deities, the epics as well as stories on contemporary issues like AIDS, literacy, rural sanitation, nutrition etc. A story telling style that adds much gesture and dance to the story is ottan thullal of Kerala. This colourful form was started by poet Kunchan Nambiar when he was rebuked by a Chakyar storyteller hundreds of years ago. In response, he wrote satirical tales to be told in a new style: with dance, simpler language, lively music, costume and humour.

We also have story telling forms where the teller tells with little or no music, without props. Chakyar koothu is performed in some temples of Kerala by a skilled actor with a large solo drum played sparingly behind him. Also in Kerala, padagam is an even simpler form with one man alone telling the story. In dasakathia from Orissa, two men share myths using their voices and simple wooden clappers for rhythm.

As story telling helps adults pass on wisdom, knowledge and culture, our homes have also become places where innumerable stories are told by our grandparents, aunts and uncles. Thus we see that Indian culture is thoroughly steeped in storytelling, and at the same time storytelling is a key part of our lives.

An interesting form of story telling is the Kaavad Katha tradition of Rajasthan. Kaavad is a portable wooden temple/shrine that has visual narratives on its multiple panels that are hinged together. These panels open and close like doors simulating the several thresholds of a temple. The visuals are those of Gods, goddesses, saints, local heroes and the patrons.

It is made by the Suthar (carpenter) community in Mewar. Kaavads are commissioned by traditional storytellers (kavariya bhats), who specify what is to be depicted on the shrine. The box consists of an elaborate series of painted hinged panels. Most kaavads follow the same general format: illustrations from the great epic, the Ramayana, on the left series of panels and scenes from the life on Krishna on the right, with references to local myths and patrons towards the end. The story-teller opens them in sequence with the events in his narration. This portable temple/shrine comes to the devotee rather than the devotee going to the temple (Bhanawat, 1975).

The *Kaavadiya Bhat* periodically brings the shrine to his patron's house to recite his genealogy and to sing praises of his ancestors. He also recites the stories especially those that relate to the patron saint of the community concerned. The Kaavadiyas (storytellers) and their jajmans (hereditary patrons) consider the Kaavad as a sacred shrine which demands certain rituals to be followed, listening to genealogies, epic stories and making donations. It is believed that listening to stories purifies the soul and reserves a place of entry for the devotee in heaven.

However, with the changing dynamics of the Indian society, the fervour of the story telling tradition has changed remarkably. There has been a major influx of technology where children are left to their own devices by busy parents who provide them the best that money can buy. At the same time with nuclear families being the norm, parents are not able to take time out to acquaint children with their own background. In this globalised world, the traditional story tellers are also finding it difficult to find a place for themselves as well as for their art. With the onset of different sources of entertainment, the story telling tradition is becoming redundant which is visible at both macro and micro level. In today's situation, the bond between the storyteller and the listener hangs by a fragile thread and this has an enduring impact on our coming generation.

The emphasis on education (as indicated by help with reading) as preached by the school and school system is much stressed upon undervaluing the impact of story-telling on the language learning ability of the child. This can be largely attributed to ignorance of the community on importance of story-telling and the lack of occurrence thereof. The lack of libraries in schools is also one of the reasons for children not developing an interest and love for books.

The importance of early grade reading cannot be denied and for children to be lifelong learners, this particular area cannot be ignored. Thus seeing the emerging gap created by the lack of learning resources, in 2013, Government of India launched its nationwide programme on development of language.

## THEN AND NOW....

I had often heard that time flies. Surely time did fly so swiftly, in the experience of mine that I recount in the next lines, that I now reckon that the adage must be true.



Vidit was probably seven or eight years old when he entreated to us that he should be sent to study in a Boarding School. To us the reasons may not have been very clear then but I can connect the dots now. So going back to the story, his persistent demand seemed to be as if he was not satisfied with any of the schools that the city could offer. He tried adapting to the environment of the schools that he had frequently changed to get things working but nothing appeared to satiate his curiosity, stimulate his imagination and provide him with enough challenge to whet his appetite. Concerned at this development, we started looking for a residential school that could offer the kind of challenge which Vidit must have wanted all along. He came to the Fort and loved the place, instantly. He felt that he belonged here! In retrospect, I must say that perhaps we were not able to fully comprehend his inclination for doing things differently or his passionate nature of doing everything to his best potential while setting high benchmarks for himself. In the end, we gave in to his request and decided to admit him to The Scindia School in grade VII, in the year of 2017.

In recollection, it was a tough decision for me to make, as I can imagine it would be for any mother to take. Sometimes I must have felt that it was rather harsh of me to send Vidit- who was a little more than eleven to a Boarding school, but deep down I knew that he was mentally ready to face a challenging yet fulfilling life in the environs of a boarding school.

It was 8th July 2017, when Vidit had to be dropped off. We didn't find him nervous, or even sentimental while leaving him at the Fort and I don't know from where, but he got the strength not to shed a single tear in front of us.

One day that I specifically remember about his younger days at the Fort is that he had succumbed to a high fever right before his first debate presentation in an Inter House Debate Competition and consequently couldn't get the permission to participate in it. But it was after he cried and pleaded to **Dr Bhakuni** and **Ms Puja Pant**, that they finally took him in and he, to his greatest surprise, won the

debate. Since then, I have seen Vidit move from strength to strength. He called us every week at home to talk about the new developments in his interests. He soon became the Junior House Prefect. Surely, it was the foresightedness of his Housemaster, **Ms Anita Pandey** and his teachers, that they recognized his uniqueness and cast some magic spell to help him bring out the best version of himself!

More recently, I recall, with a great sense of humility and a subtle sense of pride about the time when he delivered his speech on the Founder's Day of 2022. When he entered these hallowed portals and watched the Deputy Senior School Prefect giving his speech back in 2017, he had asked me then to give him six years to do the same. As I sat among the audience who had become teary-eyed listening to his promise to me, way back then; an episode that he mentioned therein, I recalled his promise which he has so wonderfully fulfilled.

During his six years at school he dabbled into and pursued several activities. He probably visited around 15 schools in the country for his IPSCs, Round Squares, Debates, Quizzes and what not and being with the children there, he sometimes came back with trophies and certificates but every time with a bag full of stories from schools all across India.

Out of nowhere and without telling anyone and I do not know how and really when, he started writing poetry. He could already write well in English and Hindi but to our surprise the school gave him the environment to self-teach himself a whole new language and a new genre of poetry- *Urdu*.


Today, when I see him as a confident young man, as a scholar and a fine orator, I feel that my decision to send him to The Scindia School was a right one. If he had not come here, perhaps, we as parents would never have been able to bring out these talents of his. He always speaks so highly about his teachers back in school, from his House Master- Mr Srijith Pillai to Mr Vishesh Sahai and so many other staff members who always engaged him in discussions and activities and allowed him to do what he actually loves- to explore and stretch his limits and live himself to the fullest.
