Lamdon School pupils. We traveled to the highest saltwater lake in the world, Pangong Tso on 2 July, after five days of arduous labour. Unexpectedly, 12 individuals managed to accomplish this difficult expedition that took 8 hours to finish in total. The next day, we set out for Yurutse village that was 13000 feet above sea level. As we descended, it began to rain, adding to our challenges. But that wasn't all—it rained for the next twenty four hours. Sadly we had to miss our trek to Ganda La pass which was 17000 feet. It was a harrowing event for all of us when we experienced severe rain and landslides on the way back from Rumbak Base Camp. The arid mountains around Leh were exhibiting the effects of global warming. We arrived at our accommodation in Leh safely after overcoming all obstacles. Nevertheless, because our luggage was caught in a landslide, it arrived after twenty-four hours. On the 11th of June when the sky cleared and the airline services resumed, we boarded our flight to New Delhi.

The day ended with a hearty meal at Burger King.

17th June 2023 is etched in our memories forever. The group boarded the bus to travel to Mount Titlis and on the way gasped at the most breathtakingly beautiful mountain scene. It felt a heavenly abode, so serene and enchanting that we lost the sense of time and space. The instructor drilled the necessary into us because we had to take cable cars and the humongous Rotair at different points. The Scindian affection for heights demonstrated itself as most of us reached the highest level and shot photographs capturing the silvery white landscape and frozen lakes in the background. The Chocolate factory next, brought us all into childhood as we listened to the story of Calliere, passing through a labyrinth of doors, hearing the prerecorded handsets which were given to us. We came to know how a sinful drink came to be loved by people 'en masse'. Our bliss came right at the end as we tossed chocolates in our mouth and that too for free! Coming out into the shopping area, we splurged on chocolates. Thereafter we boarded the bus to grab a meal at Burger King.

On 18th June we rode to Geneva in the morning. Our first destination was the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Museum which posed the most poignant question to us- How does humanitarian action affect us all, here and now? It welcomed us in an open, agile and warm manner, as a place of memory, creation and debate. The hall containing testimonies of prisoners of war and the pictures of those who have lost their families to the most brutal acts in the history of mankind, became tears in our eyes as we heard and went through all of them. To quote from the museum wall: "Human beings are social beings who are defined by their links with others. When those links are broken, they lose part of their identity and bearings." We all felt the pain shooting through us as we stood in each part, rendered utterly silent by the crass cacophony that unhumanitarian human acts have created. The 'Broken Chair' further pulled us into deep reflection. A symbol of both fragility and strength, precariousness, and stability, it reminded us to denounce what is unacceptable and to stand up for the rights of individuals and communities. We also saw the building of the United Nations and immediately spotted the Indian Tricolour flying in all its glory. We visited the Basilica of Notre Dame of Geneva next. It is a Roman Catholic church located in Geneva, Switzerland, dedicated to the Blessed Virgin

Mary. Our guide, Ms Marianne explained the neo gothic style of the church which houses relics from before the Protestant Reformation. The stainedglass windows which heralded the evolution of the art of stained glass during the twentieth century, dominantly seen in the basilica, were particularly remarkable.

19th June found us visiting CERN as our first destination for the day. An international conglomeration of scientists across the world, it helps to uncover what the universe is made of and how it works. We could just visit the outer area because the building was under renovation. Thereafter we took to Piazza dei Miracoli or the Square of Miracles which is dominated by four great religious edifices: the Pisa Cathedral, the Pisa Baptistry, the Campanile, and the Camposanto Monumentale. The most prominently known among these is the Leaning Tower of Pisa. We came to know that in May 2008, engineers announced that the tower had been stabilized such that it had stopped moving for the first time in its history. They stated that it would be stable for at least 200 years!

Upon arrival in Rome on 20th June, we wasted no time in visiting the mighty Colosseum, an architectural masterpiece that stands as a testament to the grandeur of ancient Rome. Stepping into the amphitheatre, we could almost hear the echoes of gladiator battles and roaring crowds. Exploring the intricate corridors, we marvelled at the engineering marvels and rich history contained within its walls.

Adjacent to the Colosseum, we ascended Palatine Hill, one of the seven hills of Rome. From the top, we enjoyed the breathtaking and panoramic views of the city, while imagining the opulent palaces and gardens that once graced this imperial residence. Continuing our journey, we wandered through the Roman Forum, the ancient centre of political, religious, and commercial life. The wellpreserved ruins and majestic columns transported us back in time, revealing glimpses of the vibrant civilization that thrived in this remarkable site.

No visit to Rome is complete without exploring the spiritual haven of Vatican City. As we entered St. Peter's Square, the grandeur of the place was aweinspiring. The magnificent basilica stood majestically, its dome reaching towards the heavens. We marvelled at the intricate artistry and sacred beauty of St. Peter's Basilica, home to masterpieces such as Michelangelo's Pietà.

Within Vatican City, we also visited the Vatican Museums, where we were immersed in a treasure trove of artistic masterpieces and historical artifacts. The Sistine Chapel, with its famous ceiling painted by Michelangelo, left us in awe of its beauty and spiritual significance. To satisfy our appetite, we indulged in the flavours of the authentic Italian cuisine. From mouthwatering pasta dishes and wood-fired pizzas to creamy gelato and rich espresso, every bite was a celebration of Italy's culinary prowess. We explored local trattorias and charming cafes, allowing ourselves to be immersed in the warmth and hospitality of the Italian dining experience.

On 21st we drove to Florence, with our eyes feeding upon the beauty of the orchids and fields of Italy. After lunch, we took a guided tour around Florence, stopping at Palazzo Vecchio and learning about the legends behind the famous Greek sculptures and statues of the Roman and Greek Gods. Thereafter we drove to Milan. On 22nd we were in for our last day of the trip. We stopped at Duomo Di Milano, Italy's largest church and the centrepiece of the entire city and Pallazzo Reale, the Royal Palace of Milan and one of the city's most visited exhibition spaces. ### Mrs Ahilya Shinde (July 1985-April 2022)

Mrs Ahilya Shinde was a teacher, a mentor, a leader who believed in nurturing talent and was ever ready to appreciate her students or colleagues. Mrs Shinde joined the school as a Hindi teacher in July 1985. Her interest in music soon led her to the Music department in the coming years. A trained vocalist with a lot of enthusiasm to teach, she was instrumental in creating and infusing interest



in Music for many students. Her renowned students have publicly expressed their gratitude on many occasions. Under her guidance Junior students enjoyed daily assembly, Krishna Janmashtami, Ganpati Celebrations, Freshers Play, Junior House Evenings and many more celebrations. She directed plays, skits, and prepared students for elocutions with equal ease. She remained with Junior school for 15 years as a Hindi and Music teacher. She was the first House master of the then newly created House- Nimaji. As a Housemaster she was a strict disciplinarian with a lot of warmth. In 2000, she moved to the Senior School. She is best remembered for her contribution to Founder's Day and Annual plays with her team. She rose to become the Dean of Activities after her term as a Housemaster was over. She had also organized interaction with the differently abled school students, also enthusiastically participated in community service programs. The school witnessed Musical Ballet and Musical drama during her tenure. A relentless perfectionist, learner, graceful, sincere, and persuasive leader with infectious laughter, that is how school will



successfully organized the IPSC band Competition.

Simultaneously, Mr Sharma was involved with the labor camp and community service around the Fort. He successfully led the Labour Camps for many years and earned high praise from local authorities. After remarkable success with Brass Band, Mr Sharma's help was sought in the Water Harvesting Project of the school. Mr Sharma also served as the Housemaster of Daulat House. For a brief period, Mr Ramesh Sharma also looked after the Games Department. No doubt the kind of discipline he could infuse was remarkable. Mr Ramesh Sharma will be remembered as a man with the MIDAS touch. Whatever responsibilities came along his way he took it to a higher level.

### Mr Raja Banerjee (July 1996-April 2023)

Mr Raja Banerjee joined the school as a successor to Mr Chatterjee, an established and an experienced Music Teacher at school. Establishing himself and his style of music was a task which he successfully achieved within a brief period. Though basically vocalist, Mr Banerjee also has expertise in composing orchestras. During Centenary celebrations he displayed his remarkable musical skills. He prepared an Orchestra for Founder's Day every year based on a different raga. He gave an opportunity to 100 students in the Orchestra. For many years under his guidance students got a chance to perform at Astachal. He also used regular morning assemblies as an opportunity for his students. Mr Banerjee continued organizing Basant Panchami and helped students during the Inter-House competitions and various musical evenings. To create a larger awareness, he helped in the organization of SPIC MACAY programs, thereby giving the entire school community, an opportunity to witness the performances of renowned maestros. He took the initiative to provide international exposure through cultural exchanges to Canada and Turkey. The school will miss Mr Banerjee's beautiful renditions in the morning assembly and his graceful presence in various programs.

### In Memoriam - Dr. Tej Singh Ingle

Popularly known as Dr. Ingle or Ingle Sahib, he passed away in Vadodara on June 28 at 05:38 am at the age of 83 leaving behind his wife, and children Uday, Abhay and Radhika and their families.

Scindia was lucky that we had Dr. Ingle as a Chemstry teacher, Head of Chemistry, Housemaster Jyotiba House and ultimately even the Bursar there. Coming from a well known family of aristocrats of Gwalior, he was first offered a job in a local college but HH Jiwaji Rao advised him to join The Scindia School. Scindia was lucky that we had Dr Ingle, his wife and all three children growing there for his full length of service. The family, led by Dr Ingle, added much to the life there in every way.

When I arrived in the school as its Designate Head on April 15, 1994, Dr Ingle, as the Bursar was very much there to receive us with all his characteristic warmth and courtesy. My wife and I were struck by his simplicity and naturalness and humility.

Later on, one day, when relaxed he said to me, "We met first in Kanpur for the Conclave and we had known that you were coming as the successor to Dr Singh so I tried to shake hands with you as we got off the bus in front of the hotel." Interesting!


With time I got to know Dr Ingle and his family slowly and closely. It is this connectivity, both personal-family and professional that was for me the strength of the Scindia School – the human base – and not its concrete and mortar. I always found him cheerful and smiling and kind to all. He was never grumbling nor complaining about anyone. He also had his quiet clean sense of humour without trying to hurt anyone or hitting below anyone's belt any time. During our professional association, I found that the school community as also the Old Boys and the city people trusted him and respected him. I was amused by his friendship with Mr R S Garg. They were not just neighbours in the quarters opposite the Basketball Courts but could be often seen together. After Mr Garg had planted all those trees to make an avenue along the road past the Sick-Room and, under the advice and help of Dr Ingle and Mr Garg we had also bought a tractor and trolley from the city, I often saw both of them ensuring that the trees were being watered regularly.

Of course, I was not too happy that when I took over the school, I had to 'battle' with the hangover of the 'Unionbazi' and court cases against the school. However, Dr Ingle, Mr Garg and Mr RK Tewari (VP), Mr ON Dikshit and Mr NK Tewari never made any references to these activities.

Moreover, Dr Ingle even once said to me, "Sir, you will have to go to the Provident Fund Office and sort out the details of the PF linked Life Insurance with the clerks there."

So, one day, he and I left for Indore via Bhopal. Interesting! The job was done. NK Tewari had done the paper work and Dr Ingle had helped me with the negotiations in the Indore office – and strange that I got all the credit for the





success of this plan. People forget that it was plain simple collaboration. No one took the credit or thumped his chest and we all thanked God that justice had been done. Yes, the simplicity, honesty and directness of Dr Ingle helped us all.

In the course of our conversation, now and then, I heard from him that one of his ancestors, Ambuji Ingle ruled over Kota and his family even had their haveli next to our Suraj Kund. His father, too, had perhaps studied in our good old Sardar School. Of course Ingles have their property in the city. Neither he nor his wife ever boasted about this side of their family. They remained a plain simple and honest family of a schoolmaster.

Late one night, I went to Jyotiba House looking for a boy there. Dr Ingle said, "The boy is not here but must be in Jayappa House."

I went to Jayappa House but the boy was not there. As I got back to Dr Ingle, he said that that the boy had broken bounds to see a film but has got back and has gone up to the roof of the House via the circular stair case. He advised me to go back because if the boy were to see me, he might jump down. I accepted his advice as I knew that he ran his house quietly without using a cricket bat or a hockey stick or by slaps or shouting. He extended quiet paternal care.

He extended a similar care to the admin staff and Class IV under his care. No wonder, they all trusted him and loved him. I cannot remember him playing any games in my time, but I always found him sporting in his ways at all times with everyone.

He went on to explain to me once that he cannot sit with 'Maharaj' on the same sofa as him like some other teachers do because of his respect for 'Maharaj'. The same way, he would not quite smoke or drink before me: How could he ever blow smoke into my face? Once only, when Garg and he came to my residence after procuring rice from Gohad did they both say, "We are really tired. We can have a drink, if you permit."

Actually, every time Dr Ingle and Mr Garg came to my place, I got them to use my phone to speak to Dr S D Singh in Dehra Dun as I knew that the families were close to each other and they were not the days of mobile phones. Yet, they never tried to impress me with this proximity or go out of their way to impress

upon me their closeness.

His wife, Shailja, proved to be a gem of an individual during our stay of six years on the Fort. For Rohini and me, going to their home, next to the sickroom was such a joy. They had brought up a small homely garden and a lawn and always served us our happy cup of tea. Mrs Ingle's contribution to the Ladies' Club was remarkable and we never heard about her work from her but read of it from Book of Minutes of the Ladies' Club.

Indeed a remarkable family of a remarkable clan led by Tej Singh Ingle in our time. May God give him divine peace to next to Him! Dr Ingle has left behind such happy memories with us all.

I must confess that among the most interesting happenings of my life – I am 83 now – has been my association with Dr. Singh and family who I was privileged to know from the day I joined the staff of The Doon School in 1962 March.

We were both attached to Tata house as tutors with Mr Sahi as our Housemaster. We were both part of the English faculty as teachers and Mr Sahi as our Head of Department. With time, Mr Sahi left for Scindia to head the school. Naturally, Dr. Singh took over the department and had shifted to Hyderabad House, and after a little time, I, too, shifted to Hyderabad House. Interesting isn't it? With the departure of Mr. Sahi, the Doon School Weekly, in existence from 1935, fell into the hands of Dr. Singh.

With time Mr Sahi retired from Scindia to hand over the reins to Dr. Singh. I was delighted because Scindia is not only my alma mater but where I also took birth. I was naturally happy that Scindia was in safe hands. Lo and behold! After a few years, my elder sister, Rama Handoo, herself a former Scindian had been invited by Dr. Singh to be the Matron of Dattaji House.

Anyone can see that Dr Singh and family and I, both professionally and at personal level have had long and happy relationship. My parents, too, respected Dr. Singh and Mrs Singh though they had never worked together. My father was not at all surprised to find Dr. Singh succeed Mr Sahi whom my father had known personally as they both had worked together in Vidya Bhavan and Scindia, and my father thought that Madhavrao had made the right choice in selecting Dr. Singh as Mr Sahi's successor.

For this selection there was a long list of distinguished candidates and quite a few from the school itself. When a candidate was put the question, "How will you deal with your senior colleagues?"

The candidate answered, "Leave them to me!"

When the same question was put to Dr. Singh, he answered, "I will use my tact and trust!" For me, the word 'trust' is a real mantra of running a school as a human endeavour.

Naturally, Dr. Singh was chosen. He ran the school for over a decade and a half, adding new dimension to the place in many ways. Facilities and programmes grew as also its position in the educational world. After all, Dr. Singh had also spent a year in England to study the teaching of English in an Indian school through the British Council.

During his days in Scindia, Singhs and my family continued to interact in Doon when they came for their holidays. It was fun meeting them.

What a surprise? When Dr. Singh retired after a most distinguished innings, I got selected to lead The Scindia School, arrange the farewell of Dr. Singh, my predecessor and even take it through its Centenary. It was our privilege to host Dr. and Mrs Singh at our place.

When I took over Scindia from Dr. Singh, he gave me a sound advice: Please keep

the Admission Test Marks close to your chest; Invite the Madhav Awardees to the Founder's day first and make sure to give place to Lokendra Singh in the Guest House. He also took the trouble to take me round the city to meet the senior bureaucrats.

My wife and I were regular guests at Dr. Singh's residence, which, too, I went on to occupy before I left Doon. During our visits we enjoyed tasting Leechi Squash for the first time as their residence had two Leechi trees. I had learnt the value of courtesy and planning and socialising from him.

In the process, Rohini and I had greatly enjoyed getting to know both their children Madhu and Praveen very well.

Frankly, during my six years as the head of Scindia, I had never heard any negative comments on him. People talked about his graces and energy and of course his charming smile and the trust that Madhavrao had in him.

We are born and we will go is the truth of life but the real thing is that we leave behind happy memories of us with people. Dr. Sing has left behind many memories with so many of us.

May God give him peace in heaven next to Him!
