HOW HIP-HOP CHANGED GLOBAL MUSIC CULTURE

Hip-hop started in the 1970s in the Bronx, New York, as a way for young people to express themselves through music, dance, and art. It includes rapping, DJing, breakdancing, and graffiti, and quickly became more than just music—it became a culture. At first, hip-hop was a voice for communities facing poverty racism. Artists told their real stories through rap, which made the music very powerful and relatable. This honesty helped hip-hop spread beyond the US and reach people all over the world.

Musically, hip-hop changed how songs were made by using sampling—taking bits of other songs to create new beats. This influenced many other music styles like pop and electronic music. Hip-hop beats can be heard everywhere now.

Hip-hop also changed fashion and language. Baggy clothes, sneakers, and new slang came from hip-hop culture and became popular worldwide. Beyond entertainment, hip-hop artists often speak out about social issues, inspiring people to think and act for change.

Today, hip-hop is a global phenomenon. Countries from South Korea to Nigeria have their own versions of hip-hop, mixing it with traditional sounds. This shows how hip-hop adapts and connects different cultures.

Hip-hop's influence goes beyond music and style. It has become a platform for young people to express their identity and challenge social problems. The genre continues to grow, proving its power to inspire change and unite people around the world.



THE RHYTHM OF THE UNIVERSE

Think about the structure of a raga. It's more than just a scale, it's a melodic framework with its own rules, moods, and specific phrases. Now, listen to a great jazz improvisation or a powerful rock solo. You'll find a similar concept at play. The musician isn't just playing random notes, they're exploring a melodic and harmonic landscape, creating a narrative with their instrument, just as a classical musician does with a raga.

Artists like The Beatles and John Coltrane were famously influenced by Indian music. For example, George Harrison learned to play the sitar and incorporated it into songs like "Norwegian Wood." But the connection goes deeper than just instruments. It's about a shared philosophy: the idea that music is a journey, not just a destination. Whether it's the structured harmony of a Western symphony or the expressive melody of a raga, both traditions seek to capture and communicate the rhythm of the human experience.

MUSIC IN EVERYDAY LIFE
